HOLY TRINITY CHURCH



Holy Trinity Church, which is located in Spring Street, just a few metres away from Pimhole, is one of the many historical buildings in the area.

Although the church building does not currently look at its best, having been declared redundant as a church in 2010, it has a proud history with several outstanding architectural features. It is designated by English Heritage as a Grade II listed building.

The church was built between 1863 and 1865, at a cost of around £5,500. The designer was Mr E. G. Paley, who came from Lancaster. As is the case with many historical buildings in the area, the land was given by the Earl of Derby, who also donated £1,000.

The architectural style is Early English. It consists of a nave, a north aisle with a porch, a chancel with a Lady Chapel and a vestry to the north. Between the aisle and the Lady Chapel is a three-bay arcade. When the church was built, it provided seating for 627 people. It was extended around 1920. In the Lady Chapel there is a brightly painted reredos, which was added in 1987 as a First World War memorial.

In November, 2010 the church was declared redundant and its parish was merged with those of St Peter and St Thomas, forming the new parish of Bury South East. In spite of several ideas and planned initiatives, no alternative use for the building has been found and it currently remains empty.

Pimhole Community Farm

Stuart Andrews and his family set up Pimhole Community Farm in July 2004 with the assistance of dedicated volunteers. The land the farm occupies is Bury MBC's which Stuart has been renting for farming for over 20 years



The inspiration for this land to be converted to a full time Community Farm was Stuart's growing awareness at the inability of local children to distinguish between different animals. This was made apparent to him whenever families visited his holding. As a result he made the decision to open a facility for all to enjoy, so as children could learn about animals, their differences and for families to have an opportunity to interact with them.

The farm is run strictly by volunteers who take turns coming in to help. It has developed a good relationship with St Thomas's Primary School next door, their nearest residential neighbours along School Street and with Businesses premises in the Pimhole Area.

Animal Welfare Organisations such as the RSPCA get involved with the farm through supplying neglected animals that need a home. The farm philosophy is that for any animal that is accepted they will care for if for the rest of its natural life.

As with any such Animal Welfare venture, it costs money to provide the feed and medical attention annually for these animals, as well as repairing and maintaining their accommodations. Yet we remind all who visit or enquire that this is a Bury Resource which is both beneficial to local childrens education and to the wider community as a whole.

Any donation that will help with this local good cause will always be welcomed. Thank you for taking the time to read this.
